# **Skills Development Scotland**

Young people in S4 approaching their 16<sup>th</sup> birthday are expected to choose what to do next. Many will decide to remain in school. For those in Sandwick Junior High School this will mean travelling to Lerwick to attend Anderson High School.

This is not the only 16+ option available. Young people can apply for a college course at Shetland College, the NAFC Marine Centre in Scalloway or at a Further Education College on mainland Scotland. Financial support could be available.

Every year young people compete for a range of Modern apprenticeships through training organisations such as Train Shetland or Construction Skills – choices range from Hairdressing and Office Work to Aquaculture, Building and Engineering.

#### **Blender Short Course**

This year has seen the re-introduction of a 3D Animation and Modelling S4 short course using the Blender software package (freely available from). The 3 images above are just a selection of still frames form the animated sequences produced by the pupils. Individual pupils have developed their own areas of preference with the software; we covered modelling, animating, materials, So far the labour market in Shetland has remained healthy with full and part time jobs advertised in hotels, shops, supermarkets and in factories. For those who would benefit from additional support to enter the jobs market special provision is available from the Bridges Project, Moving On or from the Get Ready for Work Programme. Volunteering can also be arranged.

Finding out about these choices is easy. Parents and Pupils can contact Pupil Support Teachers who will put you in touch with an adviser from Skills Development Scotland. (SDS). SDS advisers visit Sandwick Junior High School to provide expert and impartial help with 16+ choices. Advisers can explain in detail what the choices are and how they can help make them happen. Parents can expect to meet an Adviser at parents' evenings. SDS may also be contacted at any time during office hours at the Careers Centre in Charlotte House Lerwick (above the Job Centre and next to the Viking Bus Station) Phone Lerwick 695791. Help is also available through SDS new web service myworldofwork.co.uk. The new web service is supported by a national helpline 0808 100 1050
